


## Access to Information: Implementation Assessment




## Assessing extent & quality of implementation

The IAT is designed as a matrix of 60 indicators covering:

- . Overarching fundamental functions
- . Elements related to receiving and responding to requests
- . Proactive disclosure
- . Records Management

The IAT assesses these government functions through the following components:

- . Leadership
- . Rules
- . Procedures
- . Resources
- . Monitoring



## Methodology

The IAT methodology includes the following:

- . Use of local researchers
- . Blind peer review of preliminary findings
- . Focal group review of findings
- . Carter Center quality control at every step of the process
- . Comprehensive report inclusive of quantitative and qualitative data
- . Multi-stakeholder meeting to share findings and identify priority actions

## Measurements

Indicators are graded using a "stoplight" method:

- The administration has done well / met good practice
- There have been some efforts taken by the administration, but improvements are needed
- There have been insufficient or non-existent efforts in implementation

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
